
How to Enjoy Hokkaido

How to enjoy Hokkaido on the cheap! Tips for visitors from abroad!





In winter, towns all over Hokkaido host various winter festivals. Snow and ice, both natural and choukoku-sareta (sculpted), are often beautifully illuminated with colored lights. Here, however, I introduce a winter event where the main source of light is rousoku (candles). The aisu kyandoru myuujiamu (Ice Candle Museum) takes place in February in Shimokawa town in northern Hokkaido. It is a celebration of ice candles, and this year marks the fiftieth time it is held! But first, what is an ice candle? You may have never seen one unless you have experienced winter in a cold place like Hokkaido. To make an ice candle, you put a bucket of water outside at night when the temperature is -16 C or lower. The water will partly freeze into a han-tomei (translucent) youki (container) that is shaped like a bucket. Put a candle inside and light it. Like a hounou (votive) candle in a church, the ice candle will produce a warm, soft light. As for this year's Ice Candle Museum, outdoor events such as the ice candle display take place at Nigiwai-no-Hiroba plaza and indoor events are held at the adjacent machi okoshi sentaa (town information center), Komorebi. The events include food and souvenir booths, a stamp rally, live music, and a photo contest. But what really makes the Ice Candle Museum so special is that Shimokawa's shops and homes have a deep-rooted custom of lighting ice candles. Visitors can enjoy the magical atmosphere of ice candles throughout the entire town. After visiting the Ice Candle Museum, I think you will understand the igi (significance) of its name. Ice will melt and candles will burn out, but the warmth of the ice candles will remain in the museum of your heart. (February 10 and 11; 17:00 to 20:00). While visiting Shimokawa Town, you might want to stop by Sakuragaoka Park, which is known for a structure called the Mini Banri-no-Chojo, a mini-version of the Great Wall of China. This 2-kilometer-long wall is made of over 150,000 stones. It was hand-built, stone by stone, by the locals over a period of 15 years. Like the Ice Candle Museum, it also shows the warm support that Shimokawa residents have for their town.
